Course Description: Course offered in English. This interactive and innovative course is an exciting opportunity for students to increase their understanding of French culture, society and identity. It invites students to observe, discover and understand intercultural differences they encounter by exploring French models and perceptions of culture, art, paintings, customs, interactions and conversations. Relevant destinations such a visit to Musée du Louvre; Musée d'Orsay; Université Paris I (Panthéon-Sorbonne); Science Po; la Bourse (Paris stock market); Paris monuments will provide the tools to explore and critically observe the French elements of cultural performance. This will be complemented by a culinary tour of the city such as a visit to Marché des Enfants Rouges (the oldest Food market in Paris, founded in 1615); visit to a local bakery to learn how to make fresh "baguettes"; to café Procope, the meeting place for many writers and intellectuals (founded in 1686); a river cruise of the Seine.
