
FLAGSHIP GLOBAL FELLOWS PROGRAM

As the Flagship of Howard University, in COAS we engage in global entrepreneurship, service, research, or mission work. We encourage the creation of a network of professionals and mentors to support personal and career development now and in the future, we lead and communicate effectively through cultural humility and global competence, and we collaborate with communities around the world to affect change.

The Flagship Global Fellows Program brings academics, experts, luminaries, government officials, artists, and activists from around the world to COAS for short-term visits to conduct research, present their research, advance on future publication, or engage in the intellectual life of COAS and Howard University.



The primary goals of the Flagship Global Fellows Program are the enhancement of research, collaborations with the COAS faculty and HU community, and direct professional experiences designed to provide a deep understanding of global leadership, research, and/or policy.

Fellows must demonstrate a commitment to add or integrate an international dimension to their existing research stream. No previous international research experience is required. They must identify and meet with an on-campus faculty-mentor who will provide guidance related to pursuing their international research project and other professional development endeavors during the program and beyond.

Fellows are welcome to participate in academic activities such as fora, lectures, colloquia, seminars, and conferences. They are also invited to various social events, including some organized specifically for global fellows, the Flagship Network of Excellence, and others aimed at the broader community. During the fellowship, they must also contribute to the Flagship Network of Excellence Global Workshop series.

Through the Flagship Global Fellow Program, fellows share their research with colleagues, students, and faculty and can receive comments and feedback. They contribute to the intellectual life of COAS and provide an opportunity for the community to learn about current (Humanities, Social and Natural Sciences) research from a global perspective and in a wide range of topics.

Through its International partnerships, The COAS is also able to send COAS (Tenure Track) faculty abroad to its partner international institutions (i.e., Paris 1 Panthéon Sorbonne). We take pride in facilitating learning and research without borders for our faculty and research community. We provide COAS faculty an opportunity to lay the groundwork for conducting international research and advance their research abroad (from accessing resources, collecting field data, meeting with international scholars).

Meet Professor Marc-Arthur DIAYE

Biography Marc-Arthur DIAYE

University Professor, University Paris 1 Pantheon - Sorbonne, Sorbonne School of Economics



He started his career in 1999 at the National Engineering School of Statistics and as a researcher at the Statistics and Modeling Laboratory. In 2001, he joined the University of Paris-Saclay-Evry as an Associate Professor in Econometrics. He stayed there for five years and left as a senior researcher at the Center for Employment Studies, where he stayed for four vears. He then returned to the National Engineering School of Statistics as the Director of the Department of Economics. In the same year, he was appointed as a scientific advisor to the Office of the Prime Minister for Strategic Analysis, where he stayed for six years. In 2012, he became Director of the Economics Department of the University Paris-Saclay-Evry.

In 2015, he created an MSc in Data Science at the same university. He has been appointed director of the Msc program in Econometrics and Statistics at the University Paris 1 Pantheon-Sorbonne since September 1, 2016. Marc-Arthur DIAYE works in the field of modeling and prediction of behavior from data. He is a member of the Academic Council of Paris 1 Pantheon-Sorbonne University

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Proposal Submission Process

Proposal package must include:

1. Application Form

2. Abbreviated Curriculum Vitae (2 page maximum)

3. Personal Statement of interest (1 page maximum) Include your international research goals, previous experience, how this opportunity will benefit your career trajectory, and your commitment to developing a workshop (at Howard University) and to engage fully in the program (i.e., lectures, collaborations).

4. Name of international faculty mentor and a letter of support

5. Letter of support from department chair

6. Submit an electronic copy (include all documents in single PDF file) to Dr. Gladys M. Francis by due September 15 (for spring) or May 15 (for fall)
